Dear Mayor Smith and City Commissioners,

As a city resident and property owner, I am writing to all of you to let you know my thoughts on the recent activity related to changing one of the City Ordinances: Chapter 10, Section 10-15, Livestock, Fowl, Generally. As written, it does not allow any resident to "keep or maintain any such ... fowl ... within city limits." In the ordnance, the word "fowl" specifically refers to "chickens".

I am firmly against modifying the Code of Ordinances, City of Valparaiso, to allow city residents to have chickens on their property. Simply put, I don't want a coop with any number of chickens in my neighborhood, next door, or in a neighbor's back yard. What other cities and Okaloosa County have done in this specific instance is irrelevant for me.

Here are some things for you to consider in your decision on this issue.

- 1. Silent Majority. What do the majority of Valparaiso property owners want? At our March town meeting, supporters of amending Ordinance Chapter 10, Section 10-15 were present and cited approximately 500 or so signatures on the chicken petition. While that number seems significant, there are probably many property owners who may be, essentially, a silent majority, and not in favor of the proposed change. And no one seems to be organizing Valparaiso residents who are opposed and do not want chickens in their neighborhoods. It is important to know what the majority of property owners want to do about this issue.
- 2. Property Owners Percentage. I urge City Commissioners not to bend to the loud voices and pressure of the minority on this issue. I believe a documented majority of at least 75% of Valparaiso property owners (key words) need to be in favor of amending the ordinance allowing chickens to be located on residential property before the City Commissioners consider amending Chapter 10, Section 10-15. And even then, you, the Mayor and the City Commissioners, must do what you believe is best for the city.
- 3. Petition Signatures Owners. I am suggesting some criteria for petition signatures to be considered relevant. First, signatures should be considered valid only for Valparaiso property owners. Residents from other cities should not count. Second, many properties are jointly owned by more than one person: husband and wife, for example. In this case, all property owners should have to be in favor of the petition, but on jointly owned property only one signature should be counted for support. Without this second criteria, a small section of Valparaiso could result in apparent city-wide support for the petition when that is not the case. Simply put, one signature for one property.

- 4. Petition Signatures Renters. Regarding those who have signed the petition supporting backyard chickens, someone needs to confirm that all of those people are Valparaiso <u>property owners</u> (key words). While there probably are city related items in which renters could and should have a say, I believe that something as significant as legally allowing chickens on residential property does not fall into that category. Here is why. Even though city ordinances allow residents to have dogs and cats on their property, it is the home owner, not the renter, who stipulates in the property lease limitations such as not allowing the renter to have dogs or cats. Therefore, a renter's signature on a petition in this particular instance is and should be null and void.
- 5. Property Values. Property values are likely to be negatively affected by nearby chicken coops. What if entire neighborhoods have chicken coops? Would you want to be the one home owner in your area to be surrounded by chicken coops? Will that reduce the number of prospective buyers and make you lower the selling price of your home? Probably so.
- 6. Wild Animals. There is no doubt that wild animals such as foxes, bears, raccoons, coyotes, and snakes will be attracted to a chicken coop, looking for a meal. Chickens will only add to our bear problem, in the long term. And the chicken feed will attract mice and rats, for sure. Why add to our current wild animal problem, specifically bears, as some have called out in recent town meetings?
- 7. Coop Debris. Coop cleaning has to be done every week. Also, there will be more "debris" (straw, poop and empty feed bags) for the city to deal with, both for collection and disposal. Imagine a pile of two or three weeks of chicken poop and straw sitting in front yards waiting for the city to come by and pick it up along with tree limbs, tree leaves, and other lawn debris. Doesn't sound or smell good to me.
- 8. Odor. There is no doubt that there will be an offensive odor produced by the chickens. Also, I have read that some use the chicken poop as lawn and garden fertilizer. That will produce a very bad continual odor for the homeowner as well as neighbors.
- 9. Noise. Many say that chickens are not noisy. While I don't have any first-hand knowledge, I seriously doubt that statement. I have read that all chickens join in the "egg song" cluck-away when one lays an egg.
- 10. Care. If an ordinance allowing chickens is approved, who will take care water, feed, and pick up eggs of the chickens daily (key word) in the property owners absence? Someone has to step up to fill that daily void.
- 11. Costs. There are expenses associated with chickens. The coops are expensive \$400 to \$1400, have to be very strongly built, and kept in good repair. And good chicken food is not cheap. In 3 weeks, 6 chickens will go through 50 pounds of feed at \$19 a bag. Is that really cost effective, even in the long term?

In conclusion, I ask the Mayor and City Commission to retain and maintain in Chapter 10, Section 10-15 the current prohibition restricting chickens within city limits. The potential for negative effects, both long term and short term, on our city, as a whole, far exceed any benefits to individuals.

Scope of Task Order (#VALPARAISO-2023-01) Services for Gravity Sewer Rehab Maintenance Contract

Article A. Purpose:

The purpose of this Task Order is to authorize and direct CONTRACTOR (Gulf Coast Underground) to proceed with construction services for assisting the City of Valparaiso Sewer Department (CITY) to rehabilitate gravity sewer infrastructure. The activities that are included are described in "Article B. Scope of Services."

Article B. Scope of Services:

The professional construction services that CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish for the rehabilitation of gravity sewer infrastructure in Plat 1 of the City of Valparaiso as depicted on the attached maps and tables. Services to include cleaning, video inspections, CIPP lining and other related services covered in the referenced agreement.

Article C. Compensation Provisions:

As compensation for providing the services described within this Task Order, CITY shall pay CONTRACTOR in accordance with the Contract Renewal (dated May 7, 2022) and the May 7, 2019 Agreement, based on the CONTRACTOR's Bid Item Schedule (Items 1-155), as adjusted in the Contract Renewal for the actual items performed/installed on the Project. The budget ceiling for this Task Order is \$1,250,000.00

The CITY shall pay the CONTRACTOR in installments calculated based upon the items of work completed as agreed upon by the CITY and CONTRACTOR and submitted on the CONTRACTOR'S Invoice/Pay Estimate Report.

AMENDMENT TO SOLID WASTE TRANSFER AND DISPOSAL AGREEMENT

This Amendment to the Solid Waste Transfer and Disposal Agreement (this "Amendment") is made and entered into effective March ____, 2023 (the "Amendment Effective Date") by and between Allied Services, LLC, a Delaware Limited Liability Company ("Contractor"), and the City of Valparaiso, Florida, a Florida municipal corporation ("City") (collectively, the "Parties".)

RECITALS

- A. Contractor and City entered into a Solid Waste Transfer and Disposal Agreement dated April 29, 2003(the "Agreement").
- B. The Agreement was subsequently amended by City and Contractor, effective May 16, 2013, to amend the Agreement to extend the term and make certain changes to the Agreement.
- C. City and Contractor now desire to extend the term of the Agreement, as more fully set forth below.

AGREEMENT

Now therefore, for good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which the parties acknowledge, including but not limited to the mutual and dependent promises contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Term.</u> The Agreement as amended is hereby renewed for a period of five (5) additional years beginning May 1, 2023.
- 2. <u>Pricing</u>. The pricing set forth in Exhibit A of the Agreement as amended is hereby modified to include the attached Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated by reference.
- 3. <u>Capitalized Terms</u>. The parties agree that capitalized terms not otherwise defined in this Amendment shall have the meaning set forth in the Agreement.
- 4. <u>Continuing Effect</u>. Except as specifically amended by this Amendment, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of a conflict in meaning between the Agreement and this Amendment, this Amendment shall prevail.
- 5. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Amendment may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which combined shall constitute one and the same instrument. Facsimile and/or electronic copies of the parties' signatures shall be valid and treated the same as original signatures.
